## Chavez favored 6 to 1 by public in farm dispute

In the dispute between Cesar Chavez's United Farm Workers union and the Teamsters over who should represent farm workers, the public sympathizes with Chavez by a six-to-one margin.

Chavez has tried to organize not only the workers but also has tried to get consumers to boycott grapes, lettuce and Gallo wines.

Nationwide, 12 per cent (17 million adults) report they have stopped buying grapes, 11 per cent (14 million) have stopped buying lettuce and 8 per cent (11 million) have boycotted Gallo wine.

Backing for Chavez's union runs strongest among professional people and the college-educated, who support him against the growers by roughly a two-to-one margin and who sympathize with his union more than with the Teamsters by almost 10 to one. Close to one in five of this affluent segment have enlisted in the boycott of grapes and lettuce.

The Harris Survey recently asked a cross section of 1,507 adults nationwide:

"In the dispute between the UFW, headed by Cesar Chavez, and the Teamsters' over which union should represent farm workers on the large California farms, who do you sympathize with most?"

Although sympathy for the Chavez union is heavy compared to that for the Teamsters, the division is much closer when people were asked to choose between the growers and the UFW.

The cross-section was asked: "In the dispute between the farm workers' union, headed by Cesar Chavez, and farm operators over unionization of the large California farms, who do you sympathize with more — Chavez's farm union or the farm operators?"

Although opinion is divided among the public, support for Chavez runs far stronger among professional and college-educated people. These groups also have higher incomes and make up a disproportionate share of the dollars spent on products and services. The affluent were therefore a special target of Chavez and his farm union in organizing a consumer boycott of grapes and lettuce.

The Harris Survey asked the cross section: "Have you stopped buying and eating/drinking (READ LIST) to support the efforts of Cesar Chavez to organize farm workers into his union or not?"

Basic to the appeal of Chavez and his cause is the widely held view that farm workers are paid below average wages. The public places farm workers' pay as the lowest of 25 industries mentioned.

The cross section was asked: "Let me ask your impression of the level of wages and benefits paid in various industries and types of work. Do you feel wages paid (READ LIST) are above average, average or below average?"
